

Please see my Delegate's report later in this Bulletin and do watch out for your next Beaded Wheels label – it should have reverted to addressing both joint members.



John Towers is continuing to work on the bodywork of the Humber and examples of his handiwork with a hammer and dolly were admired. He is using a product called Novol to restore his fragile mudguards and is very pleased with the results.

Arthur Atkins loaned Penny and myself the LED headlight bulbs from his DeSoto, and we used them a couple of times in the Bedford on our recent Veteran & Vintage adventure. They were very good, and when we get our own from the UK, I will not be so apprehensive about driving the old girl at night anymore.

Trevor Farr has had an electrical fault in the Model A which affected the battery charging. Although the suspect was the generator, the fault was found to be in the regulator, and soon fixed.

Guest Speaker

Everyone gave Peter Lodge of Norton race bike fame a very warm welcome. Peter had brought along his Norton ES2 Race bike for everyone to see. Peter's bike is a real credit to him and his team, being one of the fastest push-rod machines competing in the

world. The bike has performed astonishingly well both here, in Australia and at the Isle of Man. Weighing in at 120 kg with 60 bhp and cracking 134 mph.

In the senior race at the Isle of Man the Norton, with its Irish rider Mike Browne, finished 3rd with a lap time of 110 mph. Mike also won the 250cc race on a Yamaha. Mike has adjusted extremely well to the bike according to Peter and has recorded some impressive wins.

Peter says the secret with pre-1963 race bikes is to keep the engine as cool as possible. To achieve this, he's had the magnesium barrel and head cast with additional fins, along with the engine oil running through the frame to further cool the engine.

The team's recent assault on the Isle of Man over the two weeks with the Norton was a great experience. Peter is making plans to go back again in August.

Mike Browne also raced the Norton at the final Pukekohe Classic Festival in February, he was narrowly beaten by a wheel in his first ever race at the circuit, but then he won all his remaining races.

The meeting ended with a rousing applause for Peter, thanking him for his enlightening and entertaining presentation and for bringing along the impressive ES2 Norton.

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2023 NATIONAL VETERAN RUN

I knew when it was first suggested that we organise another National Veteran Rally in Auckland, we had to look for a venue in South Auckland, away from the busy roads. We looked at several sites over many months before we settled on La Valla just outside Tuakau. Then quite by accident, one day, we discovered Tuakau was now in the Waikato.

The pluses with La Valla were that all the evening meals could be on site, there was some accommodation there with the balance at the Tuakau Hotel was close by. La Valla had ample parking for the trailers, lovely grounds which we could use each day to start and finish the runs, a licenced bar, a picture theatre and massive grounds that would even accommodate the gymkhana. We were surprised when we were told they had sixty-seven staff working from there and had previously catered for 500 people one night. The kitchen also supplies a lot of schools in South Auckland with lunches each day. We made a number of trips there in the months leading up to the event and the venue grew on us more and more with each visit, we knew we had made the right decision.

La Valla did have a minimum number for meals and then a maximum number for vehicles in the grounds, so to get the numbers, we had to have a good advertising campaign and at the same time keep it low key. I had once organised a run for the Horseless Carriage Club a number of years ago from London Road to Brighton Street. At the time I made a list of anybody who had a motorable veteran in the Auckland area. When I looked at my list I could see many had passed on, but I also knew more people in the Auckland area had acquired veterans. What I hadn't realised was that half the veteran vehicles in Auckland were now with people outside the car clubs and the new owners had never driven the vehicles. We sent out newsletters, sent out many emails and made lots of phone calls and after a lot of work finished up with 50 entries.

The event was also being organised to mark the 50th Auckland Veteran Run. During planning I had looked back at all the veteran runs over last fifty years organised by the VCC in Auckland. I could see that where someone had done something different and where they took the event away from the city numbers increased. In the late 1990s the numbers had peaked at 33 entrants and in more recent years come down to about 18 entrants. John Stokes and Norm Dewhurst had organised more runs than anybody else and for those efforts we are grateful. The last National Veteran Run in Auckland in 2007 had 40 entrants.

As the entries started to arrive, we were pleased to see an entry from someone who had never been on a veteran rally, we were to see quite a few more too. I'd hoped for a few more motorbikes but it did not happen sadly.

For me there were a few new challenges. I have organised major tours before, both here and overseas, for old car people but it was fifty years since I had organised a competitive run of any sort and I had never organised a gymkhana, or a concours or had trophies to deal with. Nobody had told us there was also a set of rules for a National Rally and I learnt about those rules from a team in Wanaka who had organised the previous rally.

My wife Nicola, who was rally secretary had to join the club. However, it did mean there was some free advertising in Beaded Wheels and some sponsorship that we really needed. I then could see we had to recruit a lot of marshals to assist, again something I had not done before. I really appreciate all those who put up their hand to help, thank you.

We had a short and long run each day and John Stokes plotted the runs and John Morrison checked the runs with a little help from yours truly. The event started on Friday morning with breakfast at La Valla. We had lunch at Maxwells Golf Retreat in Ramarama that day. The short run skirted around the base of the Bombay Hills. The long run went over the Razorback and into the Hunuas. When we returned to La Valla the skies opened up and it was a very wet gymkhana for some.

I must thank Wayne Roberts, John Campbell, Roger Morrison, and Don Johnston who stayed there until the end and got very wet. Tracey Winterbottom had volunteered to provide a barbecue Friday night, with help from others, that went down well. After the barbecue we went to the theatre to see the great old film Out of Africa.

Day two was a competitive day and both runs went out to Port Waikato. The short run going before lunch and the long run going after lunch. The lunch was in an old hall on the Port Waikato Road and lunch was provided by the Onewhero School to raise funds for the Kapa haka group. The Kapa haka group entertained us with song and dance while we were having lunch and I must say I thought it was one of the highlights of the rally.

To assist us in finding a winner that day we also had a set of questions and only our leader from Hastings got them all right. When the vehicles returned to La Valla some were judged for concours, with Peter Wood and Neil Beckenham making the final decision. Rodger Ball looked after the results of the timed run, the gymkhana and the questionnaire and sorted out a winner for us. In the evening we had a very different evening at La Valla, we had a fund raiser, a wheel and some donated prizes to raise money for the flood relief in the Hawke's Bay. Mike Courtney spun the wheel for us, he did a great job, we ended ip raising just over \$2,100.

Day three was the run to Waiuku. Once there our vehicles became a public display outside the Kentish Hotel while we dined inside. After lunch, many walked over to the tractor museum and then on a shorter route drove back to La Valla.

In the evening it was more fine food at La Valla followed by the main prizegiving. There has now been 21 National Veteran Runs, with only 5 in the North Island, so I just hope someone else from the North Island takes up the challenge and steps forward and organises another National Veteran Run.

I want to thank my good wife Nicola who spent hours recording minutes, confirming menus, producing newsletters and producing the great handbook. John Stokes and John Morrison who spent hours plotting and checking runs and Alastair Moffat who kept track of the money.

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I must also thank our main sponsor Vero, who paid the ground hire at La Valla and assisted us with prizes. Thanks to OTS who provided a tow truck free of charge to pick up anybody with mechanical issues, Sticky Ticky who did the design work for us at no cost, Derk Schoemaker who took thousands of great photos, CRC, Repco, Herb Morgan, Drive Shaft, Ray White, and John Morrison who assisted us with prizes or items for the rally packs.

The trophies went to the following people.

VETERAN & VINTAGE TOUR 2023

Penny and I recently took part in this tour, a biennial event. This year it was in the North Island and ably plotted and run by Phil and Coral Kidd. A BBQ to introduce the 9 participating crews was held in their lovely home in Upper Hutt. The North Island flooding had already eliminated three cars, and the Hick's Austin 12/4 blew a head gasket climbing the Rimutaka Hill on the first day. Michael Taylor in his 1930 Packard accompanied us for one day but then had to leave on other business. All the others, an Essex, a Graham Paige, a Dodge, two Model A Fords, a Chrysler, and us in the Bedford truck, completed the tour.

The tour was an exploration of the many varied and beautiful landscapes in the remote corners of the lower North Island.

Starting in the Wairarapa, based in Masterton, we travelled the hill country to the East, had a visit to Wairarapa VCC stalwart, Francis Pointon's extensive collection of cars, old garage equipment, and his late wife's collection of vintage clothing, and did a run out to Riversdale Beach for lunch. The route to Dannevirke took us through Pongaroa, and then Towai Road over the very top of the Wairarapa at around 650 metres. A slow, twisty road, but with views out over the Pacific Ocean.

Then over the Ruahine Range through the wind farm to the Manawatu and up to Hunterville, to follow the Turakina Valley road though incredibly steep broken country with the road virtually benched into the bluffs and the river out of sight in the gorge far below, and then on to Ohakune for the night.

Ohakune to Taumarunui started in fog, which turned to rain and a visit to Horopito Motors (Smash Palace) for some, and past a large area of mature pine plantation which had been totally destroyed by the recent cyclone. In Taumarunui we visited the old Railways goods shed, which now houses an extensive model railway, a steam roller, a traction engine and a huge Railways steam crane. For our lay day in Taumarunui, some did the Rail Trail, some explored little King Country roads, and some did minor running repairs to old cars.

Our final day took us down the Whanganui River Road to Whanganui where we were given a comprehensive tour of the city in a London double decker bus, which then delivered us to our final dinner destination.

Thanks to the Kidds this was a week of fine vintage motoring on classic little roads through beautiful scenery. The company was great and we had time to get to know each other. We are all now looking forward to the next V & V Tour in the South Island in two years' time.


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LIBRARY NOTES

At the recent club-night we were very fortunate to have a very interesting illustrated presentation from award-winning journalist and author, Todd Niall, on the birth and decline of the infamous Trekka. Based on much of the information in his book THE TREKKA DYNASTY, Todd took us through the rise of the anti-establishment motor empire of the Turner family and their struggle in the 1960's to create New Zealand's first and only mass-produced motor vehicle.

His book is in the **NZ section** of the club library (and he very generously donated a second copy) and is an important record of social history, mixed with motor industry nostalgia about the once flourishing but now extinct motor assembly industry. This is a fairly colourful and interesting story of espionage, politics, business, history and hunting and farming, it illustrates how this geeky utility vehicle became a product of its time. The book is a very interesting read and Todd, while employed by RNZ, combined significant research from official government archives, with the recollections and material of those who were a part of this strange and unlikely automotive adventure, into a fascinating tale

This story begins back at the start of the 1900s in rural England, tracing the origins of the two brothers and their step dad, who, along with their mother would end up in New Zealand. The family start off by importing Bradfords from the UK, then after that company failed they eventually turned to Wolfsburg in post war Germany, to meet demand by importing Volkswagens, negotiating a deal to assemble VWs in their Otahuhu plant, which was the former Passenger Transport Company bus depot. At that time, the New Zealand government pursued a host protectionist policies and incentives to boost local manufacturing. With tight import licensing, and the myriad of controls, successive governments created the most distorted new car market in the western world. All factors converged in the 1960's to give birth to the Trekka, an awkward jeep-like vehicle with Kiwi body and a communist engine and chassis. In 1966 the



first Trekka rolled off the production line, with examples destined for the Vietnam War, neighbouring Australia, and incredibly, a promising export market in Indonesia. For a time, a new motor vehicle was finally within the grasp of nearly every New Zealander for a mere 10% deposit and absolutely no requirement to have access to funds in foreign currency. Some 2,500 were built between 1966 and 1973. Only a few dozen remain roadworthy, but more recently they have become something of a cult symbol.

More than a car story, it's a long-forgotten chapter of New Zealand history THE TREKKA DYNASTY tells the story not only of a country's industrial ambition, and fortunes of the wheeling-and-dealing Turner family, but also the social history of the government's attempts to manage New Zealand's balance of trade with the rest of the world with savage import license control, and even the paranoia of the Cold war era, in which even car manufacturers became 'subjects of interest' for spies. There is no shortage of colourful and memorable characters; Margaret Philips was one interesting and highly disgruntled customer, who went onto found the Trekka Trials, Troubles, and Tribulations Club and toured the country showing off her useless Trekka, which infuriated the Turners.

The book is very well illustrated makes truly fascinating reading. Highly recommended! The Library team
