

Annual Maintenance & Building Report

The committee, together with some help of club member volunteers have been working hard on building maintenance this year.

The downstairs flooding meant a lot of disruption but it is great now to have our bathrooms with new vanities and toilets plus new lino. The flooding issue caused us not only to check our drainage but look at future proofing for further weather events by installing retention tanks – 3 each side of the Barn and 2 on one side of the clubrooms. They are working well and now have wOooden trellises in front of them for aesthetics.

The Barn has had a total batten refit and repaint, plus a brand new roof. This was a mammoth effort by a good number of club members which certainly proved the old adage 'many hands make light work'. Roy Sharman brought a 1906 Unic spare parts list and info about the 2004 London to Brighton Run.



As a result Lachlan Rendall computer printed a stop in plastic, which was trialled with some success, a proper metal version will be made with minor modification and this should resolve the issue.

Neville Holland did a trip around the Coromandel recently and his '29 Chev went well apart from a nasty shimmy in the rear suspension on the corrugated roads. A deformed rear spring and wear in the floating spring-to-axle housing blocks (torque tube set up) is suspected. He is also considering telescopic shock absorbers.

John Towers has just remade one of the front bucket seats for his Humber, as the wood had all but disintegrated. It came out so well that he is considering doing the other one, even though it is probably repairable. As mentioned last month, he has repainted the body, and the photos look most impressive. He also presented us with a curious device to try and identify. It was a dash mounted indicator that shows that the engine lubrication system is working. As the Humber runs at only a few lbs psi, a regular gauge is not required.

Tim Gray is restoring Model T coils, but is running out of pitch to seal them. Suggestions were made as to where he might acquire some.

Richard Green has decided that while his Rolls-Royce motor is stripped down, he will fully recondition it, including all the white metal shell bearings. Unfortunately, the UK supplier of these has recently gone into liquidation, and their stock is untraceable, so Richard is having to look at other options.

Ross Bellamy has recently reconditioned the Model A steering box with a new worm, but there is a tight spot requiring further investigation.

Norm Dewhurst completed the 'Muster' in the Essex, but only just, owing to a badly slipping clutch. The gearbox is out, and the clutch plate is now lined with a more modern fabric instead of cork, and will be run dry, instead of in oil. Good luck Norm.

GUEST SPEAKER - Les Harris

Born in 1925 on the family farm in Te Awamutu, in his childhood years he found he was dyslexic which he overcame by teaching himself to read and write. He was often ill, until it was found out that he was allergic to dairy products, so once he stopped having these products his health improved greatly, Les says he thinks this is why he is now still fit and active at 98.

He told us about his life down on the farm, and about his cars and motorcycles that he owned. It started with Ford model T's then Austin Seven's, a 1937 MG fitted with a 6 cylinder Wolseley engine, he then had a 1937 BSA sports car. His first bike was a 1926 New Imperial, and then a 350 BSA special, then there was a Harley Pea shooter, followed by a Harley V twin and sidecar. He worked in the local freezing works.

He then bought a 1938 Triumph single that he started grass track racing on and also hill climbs.

In the early 50's he started road racing, for this he bought a new BSA 350 Gold Star a great bike he said. He raced at Ohakea, New Plymouth, and Whanganui against Rod Coleman. He says that he also enjoyed racing at the Paeroa street races. His last race was at Marton.

He then met his first wife and they had 7 children. And so the family became his priority for the next few decades.

In 1984 he was attracted back to motorcycle racing after finding out about the Classic Motorcycle Racing Register. He joined the Waitemata branch of the VCC. He then bought a BSA Bantam, stripped the engine down, and tuned the engine, which then could do around 90 mph on the Pukekohe back straight, he also started competing in the various hill climbs around NZ. Les was often the motorcycle class winner at these events, and some times he even beat the cars.

At the very last Pukekohe classic motorcycle festival this year Les was competing on his Bantam, and also riding Les's two other Bantams were his 21 year old granddaughter Olivia and his son Rod who used to be a production rider for Yamaha in the 70s and 80s.

The whole family from Whangarei and Wellington were at the track supporting Les. A film company were also making a documentary on Les due to the fact that he was the oldest competing motorcycle racer in the world.

And just recently Les was competing at the Manunui coastal hill climb. This Waitemata VCC event was filmed by Bill Hohepa for Bill's "Face TV" show "Dads old car" at the end of the racing Bill did an interview with Les.

When you meet and chat to Les, a Kiwi legend, it's hard to believe that he's 98 years old, he is a true gentleman. His parting words were that he's looking forward to getting his letter from King Charles commemorating turning 100.



It turns out that although a relatively minor manufacturer based in Detroit which began building cars in 1907, they became one of the leading US exporters, with an active agent in England. Could the car from which this manual came from, have been purchased in the UK and later brought to New Zealand after the war? The model J was unfortunately the last version to be produced as the company ran out of cash due to inevitable shortages of materials caused by WWI, and was liquidated in 1918.

Does anyone know anything about this car – presumably it was once in Auckland as the manual has made it to our library, at some time in the past?

Positive ground depends on proper circuit functioning, which is the transmission of negative ions by retention of the visible spectral manifestation known as "smoke". Smoke is the thing that makes electrical circuits work. We know this to be true because every time one lets the smoke out of an electrical circuit, it stops working.

This has been verified repeatedly through empirical testing. For example, if one places a copper bar across the terminals of a battery, prodigious quantities of smoke are liberated, and the battery shortly ceases to function. British tires leak air and British Intelligence leaks national defense secrets.

Therefore, it follows that British electrical systems must leak smoke. Once again, the logic is clear and inescapable. conclusion. the basic concept of transmission of electrical energy in the form of smoke provides a logical explanation of the mysteries of electrical components especially British units manufactured by Lucas

And remember: "A gentleman does not motor about after dark." Joseph Lucas (1842-1903).
